This generous donation from Kellogg will fund a permanently endowed graduate fellowship that will be awarded annually to an eligible graduate student who is pursuing a degree in grain science.

Robert Francis (Bob) Pudden

AACC International member Robert Francis (Bob) Pudden, 84, died on Nov. 8, 2007.

Bob was born Nov. 9, 1922, in an old stone farmhouse southwest of Arkansas City, KS. He enlisted in the U.S. Army in 1943 and

was in Officer Candidate School when the war ended in 1945. He married Marjorie Porter in August 1944 and had five children: Jon, Gene, Denise, Pam, and Thad.

After his discharge, Bob worked at Kanotex and on the family farm before receiving his B.S. in cereal science and agriculture from Oklahoma State University in 1949. He then moved his family to Hunter, OK, where he taught vocational agriculture to area farmers. In 1952 he moved to Wellington, KS, where he worked for Hunter Milling Co. and continued teaching vocational agriculture. He then worked for Garvey Grain Laboratories in Wichita, KS, before taking a job in Arkansas City with New Era Milling Co., later known as ADM.

In 1975, his wife Marjorie died, and in 1976 he married Grayce L. Othic. They lived on the family farm south of Arkansas City until 1981, when Bob took a job as head of the International Grain Science Program at Kansas State University.

Bob was an active member in a number of organizations, including the Knights of Columbus, the V. F. W, Kiwanis, the Heritage Foundation, the American Institute of Baking, the Institute of Food Technologists, the American Red Cross, the National Republican Congressional Committee, and the United Nations Association of the USA. In 1994 he won AACC Intl.'s Myron D. Baustian Memorial Award.

He is survived by two sons, two daughters, a daughter-in-law, stepchildren, thirty-two grandchildren, forty great-grandchildren, five great-grandchildren, and numerous nieces and nephews.
