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For the past few years, AACC International has striven to bring science to the forefront of the association. An area of our science that has been somewhat neglected, in this case cereal lipids, is featured, and the very latest knowledge and research in this area of cereal chemistry will be presented.

As much as I value the scientific presentations, I have to admit one of my favorite parts of the meeting is the impromptu discussions in the hallways. Through these interactions you are sure to receive interesting comments and suggestions from fellow scientists that you can take away, modify, and run with. Being challenged by my peers—"What about this?" or "Have you considered that?"—has led to most of my best work. There is simply a wonderful synergy to experience when you get away from constraints of everyday administration and have a little fun with your fellow scientists.

I would also recommend another aspect of the AACCI Annual Meeting experience—the opportunity to attend a Technical Committee meeting, learn about what the committees are looking at, and get involved. While you can learn a lot from a session, you can learn much more by doing! When you volunteer to work on a Technical Committee, you learn about issues, help solve problems, and advance and influence the science. In addition, you obtain access to a group of colleagues who are working to solve the same problems as you.

I would be the first to admit that planning the programming for this meeting has been a lot of work, but it is due to the dedicated efforts put forth by the entire program team. The scientific sessions are stellar, and the science, from the basics to the cutting-edge, is sure to help attendees in their everyday work.

Finally, it is difficult to plan a meeting without thinking about the first AACCI Annual Meeting I attended. It was in the late 1980s, and AACCI was meeting in San Diego. I was told I would be making not one but two presentations. I was very intimidated—here were the top scientists from around the world—but I quickly found everyone to be very warm and welcoming. It is that genuine spirit of community, along with the fantastic science, that has kept me coming back to the AACCI Annual Meeting every year since.
